

"We Are All Beggars"

In the early morning hours of Feb. 18, 1546, Martin Luther closed his eyes forever. Before that happened, the hand that hammered the 95 Theses into the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg on Oct. 31, 1517, penned its final words: "We are all beggars. This is true." And this is the truth that our Lord says makes you free.

Ironic, isn't it? In order to be free, you must be a beggar. You must be utterly dependent and reliant upon God. This makes us uncomfortable – the way we're uncomfortable when someone gets us a Christmas present when we haven't gotten them one. We feel we owe them. And we don't like being in someone's debt like that.

But what Luther would remind us is that we are all indeed beggars. And we're not just anyone's beggars. We're God's beggars. Christ came for sinners. He came to seek and save the lost. He came to heal the sick and raise the dead. He came for sinners, and He dwells only with sinners.

If we are to be where He is, we must be willing to be counted among the lost, the sick, and the dead. We must be willing to be beggars. We must cry out for mercy, for grace, and for his undeserved love and kindness. We must be dependent solely on Him and what He gives.

And here's the beauty: He gives us everything. Everything.
Forgiveness of sins, salvation from death and the devil, and eternal life. This isn't because of any worthiness or merit in us. It is because of His divine goodness, mercy, and grace. On account of Christ's death and resurrection, the Father forgives you, saves you, and is pleased with you. You receive His love, His righteousness, His holiness, His acceptance, and His inheritance. We are all beggars. This is true.

This is the heart and soul of Christianity and the lifeblood of the Christian Church. God justifies us and declares us innocent and righteous by His grace received through faith for the sake of Christ. This isn't because of our works but because of His work on the cross. We, who once were enemies of God, are reconciled to Him and made to be His children.

This is what Luther pointed us to when He took up his pen for the last time and scribbled "We are all beggars. This is true." We are beggars, but we are beggars of the God who does not ignore us and who doesn't pass by us on the other side. We are beggars of the One who descended from heaven to make His dwelling with sinners.

We are beggars of Him who deigns to dwell with us, among us, and – yes – still in us by grace for Christ's sake. For in the bread and cup that we bless we share together with Christ and each other the riches of God's grace. The riches of this grace – the Gospel in sermon and absolution, in Baptism, and in Holy Communion – are so inexhaustible that our cups overflow. We, who are God's beggars, are inexhaustibly satisfied, and we have something to give back in thanksgiving and praise.



Food Safety: Avoiding Food Poisoning

About 1 in 6 Americans will develop a case of food poisoning this year. Food poisoning is caused by a variety of bacteria, viruses, and parasites. People at special risk include children under 5 years and people over 65 years, pregnant women, and people with immune disorders or those receiving immunosuppressant treatments (like some cancer chemotherapies). There are several approaches to fending off food poisonings.

Wash hands, utensils, and surfaces often

Germs that can make you sick can survive in many places around your kitchen, including in/on your food, hands, utensils, cutting boards, and countertops. Make sure your hands, cooking utensils, and countertops are clean. Wash your hands for 20 seconds with plain soap and water before, during, and after preparing food; rinse then dry hands with a clean towel. Encourage children and adults to wash their hands before eating as well. Wash your pans, utensils, plates, bowls, cutting boards and countertops with hot, soapy water. Dry with clean towels. Using dishwasher cycles with hot water and drying temperatures is a great way to disinfect cooking implements.



Rinse fruits and vegetables under running water (no soap, bleach or produce-washing products are necessary). Use a clean vegetable brush on firm fruits and vegetables, like melon or squash. Dry produce on paper towels or clean cloths. *DO NOT wash eggs, fish, poultry, or meat* – washing these foods can spread harmful germs on your countertops.

Keep produce, raw flour, uncooked eggs, seafood, poultry and meat separate

Keep raw ingredients separate from each other, in your shopping cart and refrigerator – use plastic bags to separate these items. Keep eggs in their original carton in the main part of your refrigerator (not the door). Use separate cutting boards and plates for produce, meat, poultry, seafood, and eggs. Surprisingly, flour that has not been cooked can also be contaminated with harmful bacteria, such as E. Coli and Salmonella: another great reason NOT to eat raw cookie or cake dough!

Also use separate plates and utensils for cooked and raw foods. Don't reuse an unwashed plate for cooked meat that was also used to hold raw meat. Use hot, soapy water to thoroughly wash plates, utensils, and cutting boards that touched raw meat, poultry, seafood, eggs, or flour.

Cook foods to the correct temperature

Use a food thermometer to be sure your food is cooked to a safe temperature. Insert the thermometer in the thickest part of the food (not touching bone, fat, or gristle). Ensure the item cooked reaches the minimum temperature as suggested (see www.foodsafety.gov/food-safety-charts/safe-minimum-internal-temperatures). Keep hot foods at 140°F or more using slow cookers or warming trays.

Chill and freeze


Bacteria that cause food poisoning multiply more rapidly between 40°F and 140°F. Make sure your refrigerator temperature is set at 40°F (or below) and your freezer to 0°F (or below). Perishable foods must be refrigerated at 2 hours. If the environmental temperature is above 90°F (like in a hot car or at a picnic), refrigerate it at 1 hour. Always thaw or marinate foods in the refrigerator. Freeze perishable foods if they will not be used within their "use by" dates; remember freezing does not kill germs but it should keep the food safe until it's cooked. Clear out your refrigerator *at least* once a week to dispose of foods and leftovers that may no longer be safe. See www.foodsafety.gov/food-safety-charts/cold-food-storage-charts for advice on how long to keep different foods. *If in doubt, throw it out!*
