

with different doctrines, they cannot clearly state their faith, much less understand the differences. Because of insecurities about explaining particular doctrines or practices, some Lutherans may avoid opportunities to share what they have learned from Christ and His Word. The Lutheran Difference Bible study series will identify how Lutherans differ from other Christians and use the Bible to show why Lutherans differ.

These studies will prepare Lutherans to share their faith and help non-Lutherans understand the Lutheran difference.

When you hear the word angel, what image comes to mind? Clarence from the movie It's A Wonderful Life? Tess from Touched by an Angel? Popular culture formerly portrayed angels as harp-carrying spirits lounging on comfortable white tufts of cloud. Today, it seems, angels are all too human, such as the gritty Michael in the film by the same name or the love-starved Seth in City of Angels. On the other hand, what comes to mind when you hear the words demon or devil? Hellboy from the comic book series or the movie? Various heinous creatures

from The Lord of the Rings or Constantine? Or when you think about angels and demons, do you think of those comical creatures sitting on someone's shoulders—an angel in a white gown and wings on one shoulder and a demon with a pitchfork and pointy tail sitting on the other? For many people, popular films, books, comic books, and other media are their only sources of information about angels and demons—if they believe in these creatures at all.

Angels appear on screen savers, book covers, and wall calendars as pastel-colored feminine virtues or chubby, winged infants, while demons are either skulking black mists or hulks of roasted human flesh.

These are inaccurate portrayals of angels and demons. In contrast, this study will share the truth about angels and demons using God's errorless Word. What the Bible says about angels, demons, and other related topics is vitally important to Lutherans because what God says about these matters can be trusted. As God's people, we want to grow in our understanding of what God has

revealed in the Scriptures, so that we believe in what God teaches us about angels and demons and can share His knowledge with others."

Please plan to bring your unchurched friends as we tackle this exciting topic and answer the questions we often have when we wonder about the Angels.

What Do You Want?

One of the best-known and mostbeloved psalms is Psalm 23, the "Shepherd Psalm." There we learn that the Lord is our Shepherd. And since He is our Shepherd, we will not want. We will not suffer want because the Lord, our Shepherd, will lead us to green pastures and beside still waters. In other words, the Lord, our Shepherd, will provide for all that we need in both body and soul.

Yet, we live as though this is not the case. We live as though we *actually* suffer from want, that the Lord, our Shepherd, will not provide for all that we need. And thus, we live as though the Lord is not our Shepherd. And that means that we live as though we are not the Lord's sheep.

When do we live as though the Lord is not our Shepherd? When we put anything else before Him and His provision for us. When we think that going to work is more important than receiving His gifts in church on Sunday (in violation of the First and Third Commandments). When we fail to give generously of the first fruits of what the Lord has provided for us because we don't know what the future will bring (even though He has promised that He will lead us to green pastures and still waters).

We live as though we are not the Lord's sheep when we think that the Lord is only in the business of helping those who will help themselves. We act this way because our minds are set on earthly, temporal things and not on heavenly, eternal things. We act this way because we have stopped hearing the call of our Shepherd, which comes through His Word.

Through the Word of God, the Shepherd calls us to Himself. Through the Word, the Holy Spirit gathers and enlightens us with His gifts. Through the Word, we are kept holy and nourished in the one true faith, the faith that follows our Shepherd wherever He leads us. He promises to lead us to our true home, to the land flowing with milk and honey, to a better country, not of this world, but a heavenly one.

And so, here's the Good News: the Lord is your Shepherd, even and especially for wayward sheep. For Jesus seeks and saves those who are lost. He finds the lost sheep and carries them back to the fold. He is the Shepherd who lays down His life for His sheep. The Lord is your Shepherd. Let us live as His sheep.

Managing Your Diabetes



Diabetes has become a major chronic illness among Americans and the incidence is actually increasing throughout the world. Insulin, a hormone produced by the pancreas, helps glucose enter our cells in order to provide energy for cell metabolism. Diabetes is a disease in which insulin is not produced (type 1 diabetes) or a condition where the body is unable to use insulin to its greatest effect (type 2 diabetes). By far, the most common type of diabetes is type 2. Type 2 diabetes affects about 1 in 10 people in the United States and is most common in people over 45. However, the incidence of type 2 diabetes is also increasing in people younger than 20 years.

Diabetes that is not managed well can have devastating effects on health. Some of these effects include strokes, heart attacks, peripheral vascular disease with neuropathy and foot pain, dental disease and tooth loss, pregnancy complications for both mother and baby, vision loss, and kidney disease. Thus, controlling diabetes by managing your weight, seeking routine medical and dental care, exercising and eating correctly, not smoking, and monitoring your blood glucose and blood pressure at home are key to your overall

health.

Knowing how to live well with diabetes begins with understanding the disease and keeping track of your numbers and goals, for example, your blood pressure, weight, blood glucose and cholesterol readings, and A1C. A booklet (link below), provides information about diabetes, followup medical care, eating and exercise plans, medications, and goals.

The 20-page printable booklet also provides diaries for you to log your numbers and goals so you can see how well your diabetes plan is working.
